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1.0 INTRODUCTION



The Development Assistance Coordinating Office (DACO) in the Ministry of Planning and Economic Development has been collating and analysing aid flows into Sierra Leone since 2004 through its Development Assistance Database (DAD). The DAD tracks disbursement and other project related data from development partners per sector, region, and channel of disbursement.

This report attempts to depict aid inflows from all development partners to Sierra Leone for the period 2018 and 2019. This period coincides with the start of the New Direction agenda and the implementation of the Medium-Term National Development Plan (MTNDP: 2019-2023). Therefore, the analysis of the inflows is aligned to the clusters of the MTNDP.

The report starts with an analysis of the trend in development assistance to Sierra from 2018 to 2019, the channel of support defined as direct budget support, project support and through NGOs. Support from development partners is analysed in relation to the MTNDP.

Total support from development partners for the period 2018 to 2019 is estimated at \$939.18 million. Cluster I of the MTNDP (Human Capital Development) received an estimated 38.5 percent of total inflows for the period under review making it the most supported cluster. This is in line with the Government priorities as set out the MTNDP. The UK Foreign Commonwealth Development Office (FCDO) previously DFID, the World Bank and the European Union accounted for an estimated 22 percent, 19 percent, and 15 percent, respectively. These three partners have been consistently providing the bulk of external assistance to Sierra Leone over the last decade.

Project support accounted for **69 percent** of total inflows whilst direct budget support and funds channelled through NGOs accounted for **20 percent** and **11 percent**, respectively.

The data entry into DAD is normally done by focal persons of partner agencies, with hands on training provided by the Aid Management officers in DACO. The challenges posed by COVID-19 prevented planned training sessions. Consequently, the Aid Management Officers at DACO had to input most of the data into DAD creating delays in validating the data from Agencies and the subsequent release of this report.

We are extremely grateful to all the partners that provided and validated data for their respective Agencies. We look forward to getting the data from partners who were unable to provide the requested information this time around for subsequent reports.

The total external support to Sierra Leone in 2018 and 2019 is estimated at \$422.96 million and \$516.22 million, respectively. This shows that external support by development partners increased by 22 percent between 2018 and 2019. The UK Government provided an estimated \$207 million accounting for 22 percent of total support whilst the World Bank and the EU provided an estimated \$177 million and \$145 million accounting for 19 percent and 15 percent respectively. The UN Family implemented an estimated \$146 million for the two years from core and non-core resources.

From table 2 above, for the two years, project support which is defined as support implemented by PIUs as well as by the UN Agencies accounted for an estimated **69 percent** of total external inflows. This implies that the bulk of external assistance is implemented by project implementation units within a Ministry or established solely for the purpose of implementing a specific project and or UN organisations implementing projects on behalf of donor partners.

Direct budget support accounted for **20 percent** of all development partners support within the period. This is a good indication of the trust development partners have on the use of Government systems. Given that direct budget support is usually provided with caveats of progress in the implementation of certain indicators, direct budget support continues to facilitate the Improvement of Public Financial Management especially in relation to expenditure management.

For the period 2018 and 2019 direct budget support is estimated at \$96 million and \$95 million respectively. Of the total estimated \$191 million direct budget for the two years, the World bank provided \$70 million, the European Union \$ 48 million, the African Development Bank, \$38 million and the IMF \$35 million.

Support channelled through NGOs accounted for almost 11 percent estimated at over \$100 million. Although this amount is relatively low in comparison to the amounts provided for budget support, the impact NGOs create at the district level is quite significant. NGOs are usually closest to the direct beneficiaries at the grass roots and their operations are having positive multiplier effects at individual and community levels

4.1 Cluster I accounted for an estimated **38 percent** of the total support from development partners for the years 2018 and 2019 estimated at **\$361.1 million**. This is consistent with the national priorities outlined in the MTNDP. Within cluster I, Health sector accounted for **68 percent** of the total support to the cluster whilst Education, Water and Sanitation and Social Welfare accounted for an estimated **18 percent**, **11 percent**, **and 3 percent**, respectively. A summary of key support to Cluster I is as follows:

- AfDB provided an estimated \$7.29 million to support rural water supply and environmental sanitation as well to conclude activities relating to the Ebola supported project.
- UK Government provided an estimated \$113.3 million to support among others; the Saving Lives programme, 'Leh we Learn' educational programme, and to support Environmental and Hygiene activities. This support accounted for 32 percent of total support to Cluster I.
- World Bank provided an estimated \$58.3 million to support improved health service delivery, promote disease surveillance and response, support social safety nets programmes as well as activities relating to skills development. This accounted for 17 percent of total support to cluster I.
- USAID provided an estimated \$37.2 million to support Health and Education related activities.
- The Government of Germany provided almost **\$14 million** to support Health systems strengthening and epidemic control including HIV/AIDS.
- Irish Aid provided an estimated \$6.3 million to support UN Agencies as well NGOs working
 in the Health and Education sectors.
- EU provided \$11 million to support the Education Sector and non-state actors working in Cluster I.
- Canada provided \$1.1 million to address infant, maternal and child mortality.
- Kuwait Fund provided \$1.3 million to support the rehabilitation of tertiary hospitals.
- IsDB provided \$2.2 million to support the strengthening health systems nationwide.
- OFID provided \$9.6 million to support the rehabilitation of Fourah Bay College and Water and Sanitation in the provinces.
- Saudi Fund provided \$2.65 million for the rehabilitation of Fourah Bay College.





- Government of Italy provided an estimated \$400,000 to support health sector related activities including the Accelerator Lab project.
- The UN Family implemented an estimated \$94.2 million to support projects in Health,
 Water and Sanitation, Education and Social Protection. This accounted for 27 percent
 of all projects within Cluster I and 65 percent of all projects and programmes implemented by the United Nations in Sierra Leone.

4.2 Cluster II of the MTNDP which promotes economic diversification and growth promotion accounted for almost **6 percent** of the total support to Sierra Leone in 2018 and 2019. The estimated **\$56 million** support to this cluster was for Agriculture, Rural Development and Food Security related activities. A summary of key support to Cluster II is as follows:

- The UK government provided an estimated \$5.0 million to support investment reforms that will attract Foreign Direct Investment into Sierra Leone as well for the implementation of voluntary guidelines on land management.
- The Government of Germany provided an estimated **\$4 million** to support agricultural value chain especially for cashew nut production.
- CIDA provided an estimated \$800,000 to promote agribusiness development.
- The EU provided an estimated \$8.0 million to support activities relating to the implementation of the Boosting Agriculture for Food Security project.
- Irish Aid provided an estimated \$420,000 to support activities in the Agricultural sector.
- The US provided an estimated \$850,000 to facilitate the implementation of the Water for Food Security project.
- World Bank provided an estimated \$17.15 million to support agribusiness development, agro-processing and economic diversification.
- Government of Japan provided an estimated \$270,000 to support activities in the agricultural sector.
- The IsDB provided an estimated \$13.15 million to support agriculture within the Community Driven Development project and linking farmers to market activities.
- UN Family implemented an estimated \$6.9 million to support food security initiatives.

6.0 CONCLUSION AND WAY FORWARD

This Development Assistance Report was developed amidst challenges of getting the resources in time, restrictions posed by COVID-19 and delays in validation of data. However, DACO is grateful to the UNDP for continued support in the preparation of this report over the years. We thank all our partners for providing and validating the data for their respective institutions. The data used for the analysis is from the Development Assistance Database which can be accessed at www.dad.synisys.com/dadsierraleone/.

The Ministry of Planning and Economic Development continue to place premium on the production of this report as it gives a synopsis of which partners are providing support in which sector and how this relates to achieving the priorities outlined in the Medium-Term National Development Plan.

The analysis of the data available revealed that development partners support is guided by the MTNDP as reflected in the support for the various clusters. The higher percentage of support allocated to the Health sector within cluster I can be attributed to the fact that there are on-going programmes to build and strengthening the health systems which was deeply exposed by the Ebola outbreak. There are indications that the 2020 report will reveal significantly higher percentage of support attributed to the Education sector with the establishment of the Education Trust Fund and other initiatives supporting the Education for Development drive by the Government.

Support to the implementation of the MTNDP continue to increase as reflected in the 22 percent increase from 2018 to 2019 reflecting a good relationship between the Government and development partners.

Going forward, DACO will endeavour to produce the DAR prior to the commencement of budget preparation so that the analysis will contribute to the budgetary allocation for the sectors and district councils. This implies that the analysis will be expanded to give more details of the support provided by NGOs and the United Nations agencies. Comparison to the budgetary allocations' vis-a-viz development partners support will also be presented in subsequent reports. Finally, using the District Development Coordination Committees, DACO will present district level support from all partners to ascertain which district or regions are oversubscribed and which ones are orphaned.

DACO will continue to count on the support of focal persons in the partner agencies for the development of subsequent Development Assistance Reports.

4.3 Cluster III which is support to Infrastructure and Economic Competitiveness accounted for almost **22 percent** of total support to Sierra Leone for the two years estimated at **\$205.6 million**. Within Cluster III, Energy related support accounted for an estimated **53 percent** of total support to the cluster. External support relating to improving road network, developing water infrastructure and private sector development accounted **for 31 percent**, **12 percent**, **and 3 percent** of total support to Cluster III respectively. A summary of key support to Cluster III is as follows:

- AFDB provided an estimated \$12.3 million to support Sierra Leone's water, power, and Road's infrastructure by funding the Matotoka-Sefadu Road Rehabilitation project, Bo-Kenema distribution system rehabilitation, MRU border-Bo-Bandajuma Road project and CLSG Rural Electrification project.
- The UK Government provided an estimated \$68.31 million to improve access to water and electricity through the Rehabilitation of Freetown Water Supply System project and the Rural Electrification project.
- The US Government provided an estimated \$1.1 million to support the Power Africa Transactions & Reforms program as well as the Solar Adoption projects.
- The EU provided an estimated \$46.88 million to support roads construction including the Moyamba-Moyamba Junction Road and Bridges project, Priority Infrastructure Works project, and the Bandajuma-Liberian Border Roads and Bridges projects.
- The World Bank provided an estimated \$53.42 million to support Energy Sector Reform, the West Africa Power Pool, and Extractive Industries initiatives.
- The Government of Japan provided an estimated \$1.3 million to support the improvement of the power distribution system in Freetown.
- IsDB provided an estimated \$5.58 million to facilitate the construction of the Pendembu-Kailahun Road.
- OFID provided an estimated \$4.43 million to support the construction of MRU border-Bo-Bandajuma Road.
- Kuwait Fund provided an estimated \$4.68 million to support the construction and rehabilitation of several roads including the Lumley-Tokeh Road, Hill-side Bye-pass Road and the Waterloo-Kent-Tokeh Road.
- India Exim Bank provided approximately \$150,000 to support the installation of high voltage line from Bumbuna to Waterloo.

4.4 Cluster IV which focuses on Governance and Accountability including decentralisation accounted for an estimated 27 percent (\$253.34 million) of total support to Sierra Leone for 2018 and 2019. Within Cluster IV, Public Financial Management related activities accounted for an estimated 64 percent of total support to the Cluster whilst decentralisation, transparency and democracy, capacity building of Government Agencies, accounted for an estimated 3 percent, 13 percent, and 19 percent, respectively. The summary of support from development partners to cluster IV is as follows:

- Government of the UK provided an estimated \$16.03 million to support Governance initiatives including the Electoral Cycle and the Anti-Corruption Commission.
- AfDB provided an estimated \$17.08 million to improve public financial management and direct budget support.
- EU provided an estimated \$78.75 million to improve public sector management, decentralisation and capacity building of Government institutions.
- World Bank provided an estimated \$47.79 million as direct budget support and to fund other PFM related activities.
- The UN Family implemented an estimated \$20.83 million to support various governance programmes including elections support and improving decentralisation.
- Irish Aid provided through NGOs an estimated **\$1.2 million** to promote accountability in public institutions and human rights.
- CIDA provide an estimated \$2.09 million to promote effectiveness in public institutions.
- Korean Exim Bank provided an estimated \$28.12 million to complete the construction of the Freetown City Council Administrative complex.

4.5 Cluster V accounted for an estimated **1.5 percent (\$13.59 million**) of the total support for the review period. The activities supported by development partners were mainly to promote gender parity and are summarised as follows:

- Irish Aid provided an estimated \$6.00 million to promote women's empowerment and well-being, support gender-based violence victims and promote women in politics and entrepreneurship.
- The European Union provided an estimated \$380,000 to support women in politics and promote women's empowerment.



- The Government of Germany provided an estimated \$777,000 to address Female Genital Mutilation issues especially in relation to the fight against HIV/AIDS.
- The UN family implemented an estimated \$5.76 million to support women empowerment and gender equality.
- The UK government provided approximately \$850,000 to assist the implementation of the Adolescent Girls Empowerment project.
- The Government of Norway provided an estimated \$470,000 to support the Women's Situation Room during the elections.
- CIDA provided an estimated \$260,000 to support initiatives to end early child marriage in Sierra Leone.
- **4.6 Cluster VI** which focuses on Youth empowerment and employment accounted for approximately **2 percent** of the total support to Sierra Leone for 2018 and 2019 estimated at **\$21 million**. The support provided by development partners to this Cluster is summarised as follows:
- AfDB provided an estimated \$800,000 to support the Youth Entrepreneurship and Employment Project.
- The UN Family implemented an estimated \$2.49 million to support youth employment and empowerment projects.
- The Government of Germany provided an estimated **\$17.6 million** to support the implementation of the Employment Promotion Programme.
- **4.7 Cluster VII** accounted for almost **2 percent** of total support to Sierra Leone for 2018 and 2019 estimated at **\$21 million**. Support to this cluster focussed on addressing environmental degradation and disaster relief. Development partners support to this cluster is summarised as follows:
- The UK government provided an estimated \$3.38 million to address environmental vulnerability issues as well as to support Landslide and Flooding victims.
- World Bank provided an estimated \$4.1 million to support the Freetown Emergency Recovery Project.
- Irish Aid provided an estimated \$230,000 to support the Freetown Disaster Preparedness Project.
- The Government of Germany provided an estimated \$3.4 million to address the environmental impact of mining activities as well as the illegal wildlife trade.



- The UN Family implemented an estimated \$9.0 million to support environmental resilience
 including support to the Adaptive Capacity of Water Services to Climate Change project,
 Coastal Risks Management project, Environment & Natural Disaster Management project,
 and the Climate Information and Early Warning Systems project.
- **4.8 Cluster VIII** accounted for almost **1 percent** of total support to the coordination of the implementation of the MTNDP **amounting** to **\$7.22 million**. The summary of support from development partners to this cluster is as follows:
- The UN Family provided an estimated **\$2.5 million** to support Government institutions that are coordinating the implementation of the MTNDP.
- The World Bank provided an estimated \$870,000 for the conduction of Sierra Leone Integrated Household Survey.
- The AfDB provided an estimated \$1.2 million to support resource mobilisation and strengthening data collection and statistical systems.

5.10 The United Nations Family



The United Nations system in Sierra Leone consists of 21 Agencies, Funds and Programmes, and provides support through the UN Sustainable Development Cooperation Framework 2020-2023 (UNSDCF). The UN Country Team, chaired by the UN Resident Coordinator (RC) has provided an estimated \$146 million from core resources for 2018 to 2019, but implemented an estimated \$217 million. The UNCT is Sierra Leone's largest implementing partner in terms of resources implemented, and quantity and variety of initiatives supported.

As depicted above in Table 12, UNICEF, UNFPA and the UNDP accounted for the majority of UNCT's support to Sierra Leone estimated at **38.5 percent**, **20.6 percent** and **20.9 percent** respectively, for 2018 and 2019.

From table 13 below, the UN support to Sierra Leone primarily goes to activities within the Human Capital Development cluster, accounting for an estimated **64 percent**. Cluster IV: Governance and Accountability for Results accounted for an estimated **15 percent**, whilst Cluster VII (Addressing Vulnerabilities and Building Resilience) and Cluster II (Diversifying the Economy) accounted for **7 percent** and **4 percent**, respectively. Cluster III (Infrastructure and Economic Competitiveness) and Cluster V (Empowering Women, Children, Adolescents and Persons with Disability) accounted for **3 percent** each.



Table 10 above indicates that the Irish Government provided an estimated **\$14.2 million** in 2018 and 2019 to support the MTNDP. Support increased from **\$6.64 million** in 2018 to **\$7.58 million** in 2019; an increase of **14 percent**.

Consistent with the priorities of the Government of Sierra Leone , the Irish Government provided an estimated \$6.33 million over the period to support human capital development related priorities. This accounted for 45 percent of Ireland's support to Sierra Leone within the period. Support from Irish Aid also focussed on Empowering Women, Children, Adolescents and Persons with Disability for which an estimated \$6.03 million was provided within the period accounting for 42 percent of total support from Irish Aid.

5.9 Government of Japan



The Government of Japan has over the years been providing project support and non-project grants to Sierra Leone. Non- project grants are usually provided in the form of commodities and or fuel imports. Project supports are concentrated in Agriculture, Energy and Health sectors. Table 12 below gives a summary of the Government of Japan's support to Sierra Leone for 2018 and 2019.

The United Kingdom continues to be one of Sierra Leone's major development partners. Over the years support from the UK has been channelled through the Department for International Development (DFID) which has now been transformed into the Foreign and Commonwealth Development Office (FCDO). Over the last decade, the UK has provided an estimated \$1.65 billion to support development programmes and projects in Sierra Leone. All UK support to Sierra Leone are grants.

Table 4 above depicts a summary of UK's support to the MTNDP for 2018 and 2019 which is estimated at \$207 million distributed amongst the various clusters as follows: Cluster I: \$113.3 million; Cluster II: \$4.9 million; Cluster III: \$68.3 million; Cluster IV: \$16.0 million; Cluster V: \$0.9 million and Cluster VII: \$3.4 million. Over the two-year period, Cluster I accounted for 55 percent of total support from the United Kingdom, whilst Cluster III, Cluster IV, Cluster II and cluster VII accounted for 33 percent, 8 percent, 2.4 percent and 1.6 percent respectively.

5.2 The United States of America



The United States of America provides bilateral development aid to Sierra Leone through the United States Agency for International Development (USAID). Over the years, the areas of intervention of the United States in Sierra Leone are Agriculture and Food Security; Democracy, Human Rights and Governance; and Health.

From table 5 for the period 2018 - 2019, the US Government provided an estimated \$40.72 million to support Sierra Leone's Medium-Term National Development Plan. Support from the US Government is predominantly in Cluster I to support health related initiatives which accounted for an estimated 95 percent of total support for 2018 and 2019. Cluster II and Cluster III accounting for 2.09 percent and 2.7 percent of total support from the US respectively.

5.7 The International Monetary Fund (IMF) 🤻



Unlike other traditional partners whose support is largely project based, the IMF support to Sierra Leone is based on programmes of economic policies agreed with the Government of Sierra Leone largely focusing on Balance of Payment support.

In addition to providing balance of payment and in recent years direct budget support, the IMF provides Technical Assistance to the Ministry of Finance, Bank of Sierra Leone, and the National Revenue Authority. This support enhances monetary and exchange rate policy implementation, expenditure management, taxation, banking supervision and regulation

In 2018, the IMF Board approved an Extended Credit Facility (ECF) for Sierra Leone which facilitated a **\$21.5 million** disbursement as direct budget support. In 2019, the IMF provided an estimated **\$7.73 million** as Balance of Payment support and **\$13.86** million as direct budget support.

5.8 Irish Aid

The Government of Ireland has been providing development assistance to Sierra Leone since 2005. Over the past decade, Irish aid to Sierra Leone is estimated at **\$87.67 million** of development Assistance to various sectors of the Sierra Leone economy.

5.6 The World Bank Group



The World Bank is a major development partner to Sierra Leone supporting projects in various sectors ranging from Public Financial Management, Agriculture, Education, Roads and Energy. In addition, the World Bank is one of four partners that provide direct budget support to Sierra Leone. Over the last ten years, the World Bank has provided an estimated \$750 million to support Sierra Leone's development efforts with a mixture of grants and highly concessional loans.

Table 9 depicts that the World Bank provided an estimated \$177 million to support the MTNDP as follows: Cluster I: \$53.80 million; Cluster III \$53.42 million, Cluster IV: \$47.79 million, Cluster II: \$17.15 million, Cluster VII: \$4.12 million and Cluster 8: \$0.86 million.

Cluster I and Cluster III accounted for approximately 30 percent each for the total support from the World Bank for 2018 and 2019. This is largely attributed to the fact that the World Bank provides significant support to the Health and Energy sectors in Sierra Leone. Cluster

IV which deals with Governance and accountability issues accounted for an estimated 27 percent of the total support provided by the World Bank for 2018 and 2019. The World Bank provided support for agriculture and food security within Cluster II accounting for an estimated 10 percent. In addition, support was also provided to address vulnerabilities as well as disaster relief activities within Cluster VII accounting for an estimated 2 percent.

5.3 Government of Germany



Support from the German Government is implemented in Sierra Leone by the GIZ, KFW, German NGOs and other international NGOs. This support is focused on the following areas: Employment Promotion and Agriculture; Strengthening the Health Care Systems; Resource Management and Sustainable Energy Access.

From table 6 above, the total support from the German Government for 2018 and 2019 is estimated at \$42.77 million. Cluster VI (Youth Employment Sports and Migration) accounted for 41 percent of total support from Germany within the period whilst Cluster I (Human capital Development) accounted for 33 percent

5.4 The African Development Bank (AfDB)



The African Development Bank (AfDB) continues to support development efforts in Sierra Leone as the Apex financial institution in Africa. Over the last 10 years, AfDB provided an estimated **\$254 million** to support various projects in Sierra Leone.

For 2018 and 2019, AfDB provided an estimated **\$38.9 million** to support projects in clusters I, III, IV, VI and VIII of the MTNDP.

As one of partners providing direct budget support, AfDB's support to Sierra Leone is skewed towards cluster IV (Governance and Accountability for Result). Support to this cluster accounted for an estimated 44 **percent** of AfDB's total support to Sierra Leone for 2018 and 2019.

Cluster III which includes activities relating to the provision of affordable electricity and improving on the Road network accounted for an estimated **32 percent** of the AfDB's total support for the period.

Cluster I, that includes, health, education, water and sanitation activities accounted for an estimated **19 percent** of AfDB's support to the MTNDP for 2018 and 2019.

5.5 The European Union (EU)



The European Union continues to be one of Sierra Leone's major development partners. Over the last decade, the EU has provided an estimated **US\$1.0 billion** to support various sectors of the Economy including providing direct budget support.

Table 8 depicts the EU's support to the MTNDP for the period 2018 and 2019 estimated at \$145 million and accounted for 17 percent of total donor support to Sierra Leone for the review period.

Cluster IV which covers transparency and accountability issues accounted for an estimated **54 percent** of the total support provided by the EU within the period whilst Cluster III which includes the road network and private sector development accounted for an estimated **32 percent** within the same period. Cluster I and Cluster II accounted for **8 percent and 6 percent** respectively.
